A Climate Resiliency Plan for Madison, CT Erin Mannix, AICP, CAZEO, Town Planner, Town of Madison (she/her)

Erin Mannix is the Town Planner in Madison, Connecticut where she directs the Land Use Department and serves as professional staff for multiple boards and commissions including the Flood Prevention, Climate Resilience and Erosion Control Board. She is certified with the American Institute of Certified Planners and the Connecticut Association of Zoning Enforcement Officials (CAZEO). Erin holds a

degree in Biology from Fairfield University. Prior experience includes zoning and inland wetland enforcement in the town of Guilford, CT and varying roles within the the City of Norwalk, CT Planning and Zoning Department. Erin currently serves as vice president of the Connecticut Association of Zoning Enforcement Officials.

The Rev. Gideon L. K. Pollach is the Rector of St. John's Episcopal Church in Cold Spring Harbor and former Head Chaplain and Theology Chair of the Episcopal High School in Alexandria Virginia. Gideon served St. Bartholomew's Church in New York City and at St. Stephen's Church in Richmond, and Christ Church Alexandria. Gideon is immediate past Co-chair of the Long Island Congregations Associations and Neighborhoods, and has been active in that organization's effort to end the opioid epidemic on Long Island as well as green energy initiatives through a partnership with the State of New York. Gideon is a parent of

four (25, 16, 13, & 11), married to Sarah, a Nurse Practitioner. He is a member of the chapter of the Cathedral of the Incarnation in Garden City, NY, a board member of the Outreach Development Corporation, a substance abuse treatment provider in Brooklyn, Queens, and Long Island, New York, the Elewana Education Project, the Friends of Canterbury Cathedral in the United States. Beth Sutherland, Treasurer, ReWild Long Island (she/her)

A lifelong organic home gardener, since her retirement from a career in not-for-profit insurance companies, Beth Sutherland has explored native plants and herbal medicine. She has been studying the historic and current uses of native plants and local weeds in making medicine and supporting healthy living, and has become a Suffolk County Master Gardener and an associate member of the American Herbalists Guild. Beth volunteers with ReWild Long Island, as a board member, co-lead of the MidSuffolk chapter, and Treasurer. She also volunteers for the Long

Island Native Plant Initiative, and the Ketcham Inn gardening team. Beth is a 35 year resident of Long Island, first in Centerport and now in Poquott. She is gradually transforming her yard from non-native plantings into a sanctuary for native plants, herbs and wildlife.

Perhaps it was Jane's lifelong love of animals that propelled her into a career in conservation, starting as a teenage volunteer at Massachusetts Audubon's Trailside Museum in her home town of Milton, MA. Jane received a Bachelor of Science degree in Animal Science at the University of Vermont and, many years later, a Master of

Science in Conservation Biology at the University of Kent at Canterbury, UK. Her more recent professional experience includes three years' work in the Science and Stewardship division of The Nature Conservancy's Rhode Island Field Office and five years as Director of Programming for New York Restoration Project, an open space organization working in underserved communities of New York City. It was Jane's love of land protection and a desire to combine and build on her land conservation, outreach and program development skills that led her to the North Shore Land Alliance, where she has served as its Director of Stewardship since 2007.
